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# MIXED Qualifying Session Two PAIRS

The Bulgarian Open team was the surprise package of the last European Team Championships in Malta and there was more evidence that Bulgaria is becoming a force in European bridge when the young pairing of Rossen Gunev and Dessy Popova posted the fourth best score in the first session of qualifying here in Bellaria. Naturally, we felt obliged to see how they were getting on in session two.

It seemed that we had chosen an inauspicious moment to begin watching as Rossen and Dessy started with a poor board against Gulvi Hogberg and Per-Arne Svensson of Sweden. One Diamond was Precision and the Two Spade response weak. It seemed normal for a weak no trump type to pass at this point and West made a balancing double. Now Gunev took the opportunity to show his second suit. East bid her hearts and Popova competed with Three Spades, ending the auction.

Given the vulnerability, North is very likely to be 6-5, and perhaps South might have looked a little more closely at her hand before bidding Three Spades. What was an unattractive weak no trump with a poor king, queen doubleton has been transformed into a very good hand with everything working overtime. A Four Spade bid looks indicated and it would have been successful as Gunev made 11 tricks for +200 but a poor score.

Gunev was again in the auction based on shape rather than high cards. First he doubled Stayman to show his clubs, then he competed with a Three Heart bid when Two Spades was passed round to him. Perhaps West should have realised the danger of a bad spade break and not competed, given the weakness of his trump holding, but that is easy to say after the event. When he did compete, Popova was quick to double.

Popova led the king of hearts and declarer won her ace and played a low club to the queen and ace. Gunev cashed the queen of hearts then gave his partner a ruff. Popova exited with a club but declarer ruffed in dummy and played a spade to the ten, jack and queen. Popova exited with ace and another spade this time but declarer got the diamonds right to escape for one down; -200 and a decent score for the Bulgarians.

Fried and Elke Weber from Germany came along next. Slam is fair, needing little more than avoiding a spade loser, so that you wouldn't really mind if you were in it or not — until you saw how many tricks you had made, of course. West left room for his partner to cuebid by making a forcing raise to Three Spades and probably the East hand should make one effort now. When she did not, they played in game. Gunev led a trump and Weber won in hand and played the jack of diamonds. Gunev took his ace and led a second trump and declarer claimed the rest; +480.

This one looked pretty flat. Popova led the nine of hearts to the jack, queen and king, and declarer played on spades to establish ten winners; +430.

The Bulgarians play a 9-12 mini no trump at this vulnerability so naturally that is what Popova opened. Gunev made the aggressive decision to look for a major-suit fit, pushing the partnership up a level. The Italian West found the best lead of a low spade and the defence cashed four rounds of those then switched to diamonds. Popova ducked until the third round but it was no use as the long diamond was with the club ace so she was three down for -150. With most North/Souths going plus in a club or heart partscore, that was pretty bad for the Bulgarians, but One No Trump minus two would have been little better; it was just a bad hand for their methods.

One Diamond was again Precision. When Popova jumped to Two No Trump, Gunev might have passed as his 13-count is not that attractive, however, he chose to raise to game on the basis that he could have been a couple of points worse. West led a club and Popova played low from dummy. East now made the curious play of the jack, losing to the queen. Had she gone up with the king and returned the suit, the defence would have been much better placed.

Popova led the jack of spades, which held, then the king, which also held. Fearing ♠A10xx with East, she now switched her attention to diamonds, leading the jack. West made a serious error now by covering with the queen. Popova won the ace and played a second diamond to her ten then a third round. East won the king and played her remaining spade to the ace. When West played a club through, declarer finessed with some confidence, but though she lost that trick had the remainder for +630, a trick more than anyone else had made up to now.

While they may have had a mixed time of it while we were watching, Popova/Gunev had a second good session and were lying sixth with one more session to play before the cut-off for the final was made.

# High Rollers



Jean-Christophe Quantin, France

**W**e conclude our coverage of the first qualifying session with a look at two of the pairs who were scoring well.

Fabienne Pigeaud and Jean-Christophe Quantin at a time during the first session looked like getting a terrific score. Over the boards 11-16, they averaged 85% though nothing special was actually happening. Still, these boards are a perfect illustration of the way things can go your way if you simply stick to the first objective of playing sensible bridge. Here is Board 11:

Two Diamonds showed a three-suiter with at least 4-3 in the majors. The final contract thus was reached quickly, but it seems too easy to go wrong on this hand. How would you play on the jack of diamonds lead?

Probably, the simplest way is to ruff a diamond at trick two and lead a top spade from dummy. The ♠98 in dummy are looking into declarer's face as if to seduce her to finesse for the trump queen as soon as possible. But if declarer does so, she may find herself in trouble against good defence.

Against Quantin, a trump was led to dummy's eight at trick two. North ducked, and suddenly declarer was in an awkward position. She should go back to hand by ruffing something, ruff a diamond and continue trumps, felling the queen in the process, to finish with 12 tricks, but that was not what happened at the table. After cashing dummy's two aces and discarding the heart loser, she ruffed a heart and led another trump to the queen and king. Now North could win his ace and return a heart for declarer to ruff. As the diamonds do not break there is no way now to establish the suit by ruffing, draw the last trump and get back to hand to enjoy the long diamonds, because dummy, declarer and North still hold one trump each.

One down; 313 MPs to N/S.

When West gambled the wrong suit to play in on the next board, Pigeaud/Quantin added another 395 MPs to finish the table with 708 out of 828. Not bad. More was to come:

Now slam is a pretty good contract: either well-placed minor-suit king will see declarer home if the spades break. As there are no extra ruffing tricks you may as well end up in 6 NT. As the cards lie, any slam will fail as both minor kings are behind their respective aces. The important thing is, however, that you have to cater for the possibility that an opponent on lead might consider giving away the slam. In that event, you are much better off in 6NT than in 6♠. So full marks to Jean-Christophe Quantin for selecting the proper Christmas present to be handed to him when East led a diamond away from her king! Scoring +1440 was worth 410 MPs.

On the other board they added another 370 when E/W fell overboard again; table result: 780-48.

The first board of the next round was a pretty, routine 3 NT.

East led the queen of spades, ducked all round. A club then went to declarer's ace and the jack of diamonds came next. West won the third round of diamonds and returned his last spade, but for declarer the hand was an open book, certainly when East began to discard her established spades. The clubs were cashed and a heart trick established at the end to give declarer an over-trick and a score of only 275 MPs.

On the last board of this series, it was bingo again.

The double was alerted as 'support,' but after some consideration East decided to sit for it. She was to regret this idea quickly. On a trump lead, the contract has to go one down, but on the actual spade lead, South seized her chance. She won the ace and led the queen of diamonds. West won his king and again, a trump would have settled the issue. When he tried a club instead, declarer gained a vital tempo by ducking this. Back came a spade from East, but now declarer could ruff and lead her last diamond from hand. West can duck this for East to ruff, but to no avail, as one trump will remain in dummy to cater for the necessary club ruff. At the table, West took his ace and played a trump, but now declarer won the ace and simply led a high diamond. If East ruffs low, she will overruff and ruff her club loser; if East ruffs

with her king of hearts, the club loser goes away immediately. Just made for another 397 MPs and a table of only 672 points.

Time to go to another high-scoring pair.

Peter and Dorthe Schaltz keep a Danish tradition alive: for very many years we have seen a married couple with one Schaltz in it somewhere among the top-level players in Denmark as Peter's parents were a very strong pair in their day as well. Near the end of the session, some good scores helped them to over 64% overall and fifth place in the standings. It went like this:

A very natural sequence with 2NT the popular relay. For one reason or another, East did not bother to lead a spade. The over-trick meant a 132 MPs difference (360 to 228) At the next table:

West has a difficult call after South opens One Spade. When he elected to bid Two Hearts, everyone passed in respect. On a spade lead, this was down two without any problem at all; N/S 350 MPs.

At their last table, Dorthe and Peter picked up a two-trick penalty, vulnerable, when East thought this was the right moment to overcall One Heart with 1NT on this hand:

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Well, she might have been right, holding three tens for compensation, but she wasn't. -500 gave her side only 20 MPs, the balance going to Copenhagen (394).

According to East, West should have cuebid Four Spades instead of signing off in Four Hearts. We have to agree with East, even though she did her best in the play to prove herself wrong. A spade went to the ace and a trump came back. Now why not win dummy's queen, cross to the ace of clubs, ruff a spade, cross to the ace of diamonds and draw trumps? No: win the trump switch in hand, ruff a spade with the queen of hearts, cross in clubs and draw trumps. How distressed would North have felt when he had to follow suit with the potential trick-taking ten to the second round of trumps?

## Reactions & Reactions

Very often we allow the result on one board to affect our actions on future boards, for better or worse — generally for worse!

This is what happened to Kurt Feichtinger of Austria in Session One. He was having a bad time. He had failed in a 75% slam on one round and on the next everything was wrong in a spade contract and that was another uncomfortable minus score! Then Board 18 hit the table.

West opened 1♦ third in hand and Kurt looked at his hand and bid 4♥! This was doubled by West, penalties according to East, and passed out.

The play began with a diamond to the ace, then ace, king and another club which declarer ruffed low. Next he cashed the heart king and, taking the correct assumption about West's shape, he finessed the ♥10! He then finessed the ♦J and ruffed another diamond with the ace of trumps. It was a simple matter now to enter hand with a spade ruff, draw the last heart and run his diamonds, the king felling the queen. Nice hand reading! It certainly took the sting out of the previous two boards.

## How to get into the Bulletin

The margins between the brilliant and the trivial are tiny. So to fully exploit them, from time to time a little help is needed. What do you think of this play and defence?

After opening his breed of a 1♠-bid, North became the declarer in 3NT when South responded 2♦ at her first turn. East led a club which ran to declarer's ♣10. A spade went to West's ace and another club was taken by East's king. In again with the third round of clubs, declarer took the heart finesse. West thus scored his ♥Q and returned his last club for East to win. When East exited with a heart, declarer had to look after himself. He won the ♥A, crossed to the ♥K, cashed the ♦A and then went over to dummy again with the ♠K to play off the 13th heart. West did his best to look like a squeezed man by throwing the ♦Q, thus holding on to what very much looked like ten-eight in spades.

Declarer's next move was to go for this trap by playing a spade to his nine. Completely unmoved, East won her ♠10 and cashed the ♦K for down two and nearly all the matchpoints.

The morale of the story; no matter if the finesse wins or loses, you are in the Bulletin anyway!

## You do not need Blackwood with the four of clubs in hand!

I was watching at a table where there was a chair free behind North in the second session. Mr. and Mrs. North/South were and might stay unknown; in any event, it is all I shall give you as a clue to their identities.

You know that *26 est voisin du zero a la roulette*, close to zero on roulette wheel, and indeed N/S tried hard for a bottom but got a full top.

So you understand Board 26 was involved.

Four Hearts was not the best bid with the king of diamonds obviously being of no value facing a known shortage given North's jump.

North could have saved the plot by using Blackwood, but do you really need Blackwood when you hold the **Four of Clubs**?

East led a trump, fearing a diamond void in North. Declarer took the first trick with the queen of clubs, preserving his precious four; took the spade finesse, cashed the ace of spades, then played the ten of clubs to the jack. He then took the ruffing finesse in spades. He took care not to use the four of clubs, which came to play his role at trick six when it allowed declarer an access to the dummy via the five, so he could discard the losing diamond on the high spade.

A good story for the next edition of the Darvas classic, 'Right through the pack II'.

West's Three Spades is preemptive.

Assuming you did not travel all the way to Bellaria to only produce green cards, you will surely take a bid with this hand. A double is obviously one possibility, although you would like to have another heart. You don't think 3NT should be natural in this situation, but you would prefer to have five clubs. Four Diamonds gets your long suit into the game, but can't really be right.

Well, gentle reader, it's your call.

(By pure chance, Brian Senior's next book carries that exact title!)

When West raised preemptively to Three Spades, possibly not enough with six-card support, North had a choice of actions. He could not be sure to whom the hand belonged, but he decided that come what may, his side would be off to a good start if they led a club if they ended up defending. Once he had bid Four Clubs it was easy for South to 'sacrifice' and East, looking at almost half the pack, and what appeared to be some promising defensive cards, naturally doubled.

As you can see, there is no defence to beat Five Clubs, but imagine that North had a small heart, rather than the eight, and South was the declarer, a plausible development if North makes a take-out double. Now a heart lead would be a killer.

So, full marks to Poland's Rafal Jagniewski for his imaginative bid that earned his side a near top.

# MIXED Qualifying Session Three PAIRS

Partscore competition is the area of the Pairs game which requires the finest judgement and quite by chance the six deals I chose to watch in the third qualifying session all featured competitive partscore decisions.

First up we see two deals featuring two pairs who looked to be heavy favourites to make the final as they were both lying in the top fifty after two sessions.

Marissa D'Andrea and Guido Ferraro bid and raised spades and Andrea Rauscheid made a normal Pairs balancing double in pass-out seat. Ferraro redoubled to show his maximum and Klaus Reps started a scramble by bidding Two No Trump. East/West can actually take 500 out of Three Diamonds doubled, but it is too tough for anyone to double when the opposition find a nine-card fit and D'Andrea settled for bidding Three Spades. Rauscheid led a club, solving declarer's only possible problem (though the nine of hearts can be established for a club pitch from hand anyway) and that was an easy +170 and an average on the scoresheet.

D'Andrea's pushy matchpoint double looks safe enough; declarer has two spades and two clubs to lose and, even if he divines the diamond position and does not lose the queen to the king, still has the problem of where to park his fourth diamond. Far from being on getting the diamond right to get out for one down, Reps proceeded to make the hand without getting the diamonds right!

D'Andrea led a heart to dummy's ace and Reps played a low club. Ferraro won the ace and played the queen of hearts to dummy. Reps played a second club to the king and D'Andrea returned a third club, which Reps ruffed. He continued with a spade to the ace, ruffed dummy's heart loser, and exited with a spade to the bare king. Ferraro played the queen of clubs and Reps ruffed with his last trump. What was D'Andrea to do? If she over-ruffed, she would then have to open up the diamonds and there would still be a trump in dummy to cater to the last diamond. So D'Andrea pitched a diamond. But now Reps simply played the ace of diamonds and a second diamond to the queen and king. Ferraro had nothing but hearts left and so dummy had to make its last trump en passant for a great +470 to the German pair.

On this first board Harasimowicz doubled to show the black suits then competed further with Three Spades over Three Diamonds. Maybe somebody could have doubled Three Spades to earn a few more matchpoints, but it is a hard way to make a living. Damiani led a diamond and Lise won the king and switched to a heart, establishing two tricks in that suit. Romanski won the second heart and gave up a diamond. Lise won and led a heart to Damiani's queen. He switched to a club to the queen and ace. Romanski ruffed his losing diamond, drew trumps and gave up a club; down one for -50.

You might make Four Clubs on the North/South cards and Lise was a little timid not to introduce the suit after Damiani's competitive double of Two Diamonds. When she did not, the Poles were left to play peacefully in Three Diamonds. Lise led a club to dummy's ace. One of our editorial team has an interest in the English pairing of Nevena Senior and David Mossop. They were lying around fifty places out of the qualifying spots after two sessions so needed a sound but not necessarily spectacular session to make the cut. On this deal, Mossop decided that he was just too good for a simple heart raise, even playing four-card majors, so showed his spades then gave delayed heart support. When Mme. Poizat of France competed with an unusual no trump bid, Mossop doubled to show his maximum. At the prevailing vulnerability, I would be tempted to double Three Diamonds on the East cards, but that is predicated on the assumption that partner has only three-card heart support. Senior made a winning decision by judging to bid Three Hearts as Three Diamonds is making as the cards lie.

Poizat led her spade against Three Hearts — king, ace, seven. North switched to a diamond and Senior won and played two more rounds, ruffing. She ran the heart jack to the king and South switched to ace then queen of clubs. Senior drew trumps and had to give up a spade for +140.

David Mossop took the idea of competing at matchpoints a little too seriously when he bid One No Trump over the spade overcall. It is tough to see when this bid is necessary facing what will often be a weak not trump type and with the vulnerability against you. Still, Senior's Three no Trump raise was no thing of beauty either. One can sympathise with her thought that Three Diamonds might be bid on a lesser point-count, but Two No Trump looks to be sufficient even if you expect a bit more for the One No Trump bid. Not, of course, that Two No Trump would have been a great success either. North led a spade and continued with the suit when he won the ace of diamonds. Mossop could cash his diamonds but South had the rest for two down; -200 and a very poor score for East/West. Had West not bid his free One No Trump, East would surely have competed with Three Diamonds anyway and that contract makes an overtrick while the opposition cannot afford to compete any higher in spades.

Anton gave nothing away in the auction, and North led a spade to declarer's queen. Five rounds of clubs gave North some problems, as he was reluctant to discard a heart in case declarer held ♥Jxx. He parted with three small spades, and when Anton played the jack of spades he won and played back a spade to dummy's king. When declarer played the jack of diamonds from dummy South made the mistake of covering with the queen. Why was that an error?

North, still attracted by his original idea that declarer held three hearts to the jack, had no intention of being thrown in with the king of diamonds, so he deposited it under the ace. Now declarer could establish an eleventh trick in diamonds.

# Thoughtful Bridge

More often than not, aggression pays in big Pairs events like this one. Numerous successful examples have found their way to numerous previous Bulletins. So it feels like sort of a relief to watch players who seem to be concentrating on sensible bridge before anything else and who are doing well nevertheless.

This time, the overcall on a four-card suit was O.K., but 2♦ turned out to be less effective, as it enabled South to show her spade support at a low level. That was all North needed. When the spades broke 2-2 he was home easily, but -650 netted only 109 MPs for E/W and 305 for N/S.

On the next board the same East player, Dorte Schaltz, bid and played very well to escape with an over-average score in an under-average contract:

How many of the East players gathered here would have the courage to prefer 3NT played by themselves to settling for at least a 4-4 fit played by West? Four Spades would have gone down one at least, but in 3NT, the prospects did not look very much better, even less so when South led a low club. East won the third round and played off the ♦KJ. When South covered the jack with the queen, she won the ace only to receive more bad news. North then covered dummy's ♥J with the queen, so South was on lead again with his ♥K when declarer won her ♥A and continued the ♥10. Being out of clubs, she had to continue a diamond, but dummy could win this and throw South in again with a diamond to open up the spades. Scoring one spade trick while the ♥9 was still there as an entry to the last diamond, declarer had managed to escape with eight tricks for a just over average score of 237 m.p.

Husband Peter also gave us a nice example of how well he can play, even in the lowliest of contracts. How often have you seen a final contract of 1♣ in a Pairs event? This time, declarer really had to work for it, but he showed how to use all the inferences available.

North found the best lead of a heart, won by declarer's ace. Next came the ♥K and another, on which North did not dare to play low. On lead again, he thus had to find a switch. The ♦K duly came out next, followed by the queen when West played low. After winning the ♦A, West led his last diamond to South how now had to open up the spades. In with the ♠A, what could North do? A low trump probably works very well, but how could North possibly see this? When North returned the more logical ♠J instead, the situation cleared up for declarer when he led his ♣K and North won the ace. North had not overcalled 1NT, South had not protected, so the clubs might well be 3-3 or, more likely, 4-2 with the jack doubleton. Had North led his last heart, South would have been able to ruff with her ♣J, whereafter North would have scored his ♣9 as the setting trick on a spade overruff. However, North led another club on which declarer, according to his plans, went up with the queen. When the jack duly dropped, all was well. One Club just made for a score of +70 and 331-83 MPs to E/W.

# Dutch Treat

Our collective decision for the third session of the Mixed Pairs was to follow the fortunes of some of the pairs who needed a good session to ensure qualification. Anton Maas and Bep Vriend, starting the day in two hundredth position, definitely fell into that category.

Our featured pair got off to a good start, when West tried the dubious tactic of overcalling on a four-card suit. Three Hearts was destined to fail, but East had an automatic bid. North led the ten of hearts, and when that held the trick, he switched to the nine of diamonds. Two top diamonds and a diamond ruff were followed by a club switch. Declarer tried the queen, but that lost to the king and South's last diamond promoted North's jack of spades. +100 had to be a good result.

What did Franz Terraneo have for breakfast? He certainly had his bidding boots on! We approve of his swashbuckling tactics, well at least the author does, and he emerged unscathed.

He led the queen of hearts, ducked by declarer, and continued with the jack. Declarer won in dummy and played a diamond. When the nine came up, Bep gave it a long look, but eventually played low, and West overtook with the jack, and played back the ten of hearts.

As an aside, Karin Caesar, one of Germany's Venice Cup Champions in Beijing was in 3NT on this board. After a similar start she got the diamonds right, playing the queen, and when East did not subsequently switch to clubs she was home free. If you don't duck the first heart, then the defenders would be helpless when you get the diamonds right.

Back at our table, declarer won with the king of hearts and played a diamond. Perhaps her partner's choice of cards in hearts had confused her, but when Terry Weigkricht did not switch to clubs, declarer was out of danger. Plus 120 was surely going to be above average.

West started with three rounds of clubs, and declarer ruffed, crossed to the ace of spades and played a spade to the jack and king. Back came another club, ruffed by declarer. If declarer plays a spade now, she gets nine tricks, but she played safe for eight by using her diamond suit. The traveller showed more than one +130 in diamonds, so +140 would have been a tremendous score. As it was, +110 looked like it could easily be below average.

Despite this result, it looked as if the Dutch pair was on course to qualify, and so they did, rising 112 places.
