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A Record of 101 entries in European Mixed Teams

The Teams event was as successful as the Pairs, attracting a record entry of 101 teams.

After four rounds we have three co-leaders: two teams from France, **THUILLEZ** and **LALANNE**, and one from Italy, **BONORI**. All have 81 points out of a possible 100. In fourth place with 79 points are two German teams, **MAYBACH** and **SCHNEIDER**, and one from Portugal, **CAPUCHO**.

Many matches are to be played yet before the semi-finals, which take place on Thursday afternoon and will be shown on vugraph. If you look carefully at the rankings on page 14, you will notice that some pre-tournament favourites had a very slow start. They are happy to have eight more matches to play before the cut.

Attanasio (ITA) v Chemla (FRA)

There will be many big match-ups during the course of the Mixed Teams Championship, but one of the biggest came in the first round when Paul Chemla's French squad met the strong Italian team led by Dario Attanasio. It proved to be a match full of swings, as you will see.

One Club was strong and One Spade showed 8+HCP with either a balanced hand or at least four diamonds in an unbalanced hand. Catherine D'Ovidio led the two of hearts to the four, queen and king. Enrico Guerra played back the heart eight, covered by the jack and ace, then ran the jack of diamonds to the queen. D'Ovidio switched to a spade to the king and Guerra played the ♥7, running it when D'Ovidio played low. Next he played the ♦K to Paul Chemla's ace. Chemla switched to the queen of clubs to the ace, declarer unblocking dummy's ten. When declarer cashed his red winners, Chemla was squeezed in the black suits so that the ♠Q fell under the ace and there was no need of the club finesse; 11 tricks for +460.

What a difference a lead makes! Gabriella Manara selected the eight of spades, which went to the ten and king. Jean-Christophe Quantin crossed to the ace of hearts to run the jack of diamonds to the queen. Manara played a spade to the jack and queen and Dario Attanasio cleared the suit. Now Quantin played a diamond to the ace and Attanasio switched to a low club without cashing the spade winner. From declarer's point of view, the spades were 5-3 and he could not afford to let East into the lead. He rose with the ace of clubs and crossed to dummy with a di-

amond to lead a low heart. When the queen came up he ducked it, hoping that the suit was dividing evenly. Alas, Attanasio now cashed the spade which he was not supposed to have for one down; -50 and 11 IMPs to ATTANASIO.

A classical deceptive play had beaten an unbeatable contract. If West cashes his spade earlier, declarer has no hope other than the double club finesse as he has already lost two diamonds and two spades, and, of course, the club play succeeds. What a way to start a European Championship!

One No Trump was 12-15 and redouble was a transfer to clubs. Guerra led a spade against Four Hearts. Chemla won, drew trumps and cashed the spades. He fiddled around for a while but the defence did not crash the diamond honours so he was held to ten tricks: +420.

Quantin made a negative double of Four Hearts—a good decision if South could be relied upon to remove it. Alas, Anne-Fred Favas held a balanced minimum and thought that she was more likely to go plus on defence than if she bid. The defence took their diamond winners but that was all; +590 and 5 IMPs to ATTANASIO.

Three Diamonds has quite a wide range, particularly in the balancing seat, but Three No Trump is just the sort of bid we all have to make, and hope that partner has sufficient to allow it to make. Chemla duly did so and, on the king of hearts lead, was well pleased with the sight of dummy. He won the heart immediately, cashed the queen of diamonds and, when everyone followed, claimed a slightly lazy nine tricks; +600.

Favas did not consider her hand to be suitable for a weak two bid—the French style is much sounder than that in some other countries—leading to a slightly different auction. Quantin opened with a weak two bid in his suit and, of course, Manara overcalled. Attanasio asked for a heart stopper and was happy to hear his partner show one. Favas led a heart against Three No Trump and Manara ducked. Quantin could see that he would have no entry if he established his suit so switched to a club. That gave Manara

ten tricks; +630 and 1 IMP to ATTANASIO.

Two No Trump showed both red suits and Double and Redouble just some general values. Clearly, Guerra intended his Double then Three Heart combination to be invitational, but Simonetta Paoluzi did not think she had anything to spare for her two-suited overcall so passed. Guerra won the spade lead, took the diamond finesse, played ace and ruffed a diamond, then passed the jack of hearts; 11 tricks for +200.

Given a free run, the French pair bid their game. Favas won the club lead and played a diamond to the queen, cashed the ace, on which the king dropped, and ruffed a diamond with the jack. She had two trump losers now but her contract was safe; +620 and 9 IMPs to CHEMLA.

Double showed three hearts and Redouble some values. Paoluzi followed up her Redouble by competing with Three Diamonds and D'Ovidio left the Italians to play there despite her 18 HCP, seeing nowhere to go once Chemla had denied a fifth heart. D'Ovidio led a heart and the defence came to their five tricks easily enough for -100.

Four Spades had three top losers in the side suits so required trumps to be 3-3 with the queen onside. Well, the queen was onside, but that was the limit of declarer's good fortune. There were two trump losers and the contract was two down; -100 and 5 IMPs to CHEMLA, closing to trail by only 14-17 IMPs.

Both North/South pairs bid confidently to the excellent grand slam, the French quickly, the Italians after a little more exploration. Had hearts not divided, there might have been some interest to the play, as declarer has to sort out which squeeze to play for, but in practice everything was very easy; +1520 and a flat board.

The Italians did very well to reach the only game that had a chance of success. D'Ovidio led the jack of clubs and Guerra won and played the ♦Q, which D'Ovidio ducked. She also ducked the next diamond so Chemla ruffed and played a top club to force the dummy. Guerra played a spade up, ducked to his king, then led a low club. D'Ovidio ruffed in with the seven and dummy pitched its remaining spade. Now D'Ovidio played a trump to the queen and king. Declarer had no option but to play for the remaining trumps to split. He played a heart to the ace and gave up a diamond for +620.

When Quantin doubled the natural Two Club opening, Favas made the slightly cautious jump response of Three Diamonds, ending the auction. With North not holding four hearts, no game is especially good, but as we have seen, Four Hearts can be made on the 4-3 fit. Favas made 11 tricks in Three Diamonds, but +150 was not enough; 10 IMPs to ATTANASIO.

The two auctions were effectively identical, with the Two No Trump and Two Heart overcalls both showing the minors. There was a difference in the play at the two tables, however.

Paoluzi led a top diamond and cashed the second diamond before switching to a club. D'Ovidio put in dummy's queen and led the jack of spades for a finesse, then the ♠10, for the king and ace. She ruffed her diamond loser then played a low heart to the jack and ace. There was just a trump to lose from here; +140.

At the other table, Favas also led a top diamond, but she switched to a club at trick two. Gabriella Manara could either draw three rounds of trumps to hold the club ruffs to one, but then be unable to ruff a diamond in dummy, or she could go for the diamond ruff but then see Quantin get two club ruffs. There was no escape and she was down one for -50 and 5 IMPs to CHEMLA.

The same contract was again reached at both tables, but the auctions were different and that made the defence easier at one table than the other.

Where D'Ovidio opened One Club and Paoluzi overcalled, the defence was in control. Paoluzi led the queen of hearts and D'Ovidio won the ace, crossed to a top club and led a diamond to the king and ace. Guerra returned a heart and that was one down; -100.

At the other table, Favas had not overcalled and the choice of opening bid made it less easy for North to see the danger of the club suit. Again the opening lead was a heart honour to dummy's ace. Manara led a low diamond off the dummy at trick two and Quantin did not realise that this was his only chance to beat the contract. When he played low, the queen scored and Manara ran for home; nine tricks for +600 and 12 IMPs to ATTANASIO.

Both Wests led the queen of diamonds, which was allowed to hold the trick. The bidding made a difference again, as Chemla had no reason to suspect the diamond position and continued with the ♦4 at trick two. Paoluzi had four diamond tricks and could establish two hearts and two spades to go with the ace of clubs; +150.

Attanasio switched to a spade at trick two and Favas had a little more work to do. She made seven tricks for +90 but 2 IMPs to ATTANASIO.

ATTANASIO had started with a very useful 41-19 IMP, 21-9 VP win against tough opposition and seemed to be in good form.

The big clash

One round before the end, the two overnight leaders were scheduled to meet. This is what they did:

Langeland led the ♥8 to dummy's nine. Mariani simply continued with the ♦AQ, Helgemo winning the third round. Now, in teams play, a low club looks obvious, but in Pairs it's a different story. After Helgemo cashed the ♣A we had lost the chance to see what Mariani would have done had he been faced with a low club continuation straight away. In the actual ending, Mariani made a second overtrick when Helgemo blanked his ♠K to avoid being thrown in. It did not really matter however: 660 was worth 141 MPs but 630 would have been good for 130 MPs anyway.

On the other board of the round, the Norwegians got some-

thing of a revenge when Langeland found the best lead against a normal-enough game contract.

When the opponents have found a late fit, a trump lead often is best. So it proved here. When Helgemo played a second trump after winning the ♦A, Mariani successfully ran the ♦10 to make ten tricks. After the trump lead and continuation, you have to play double dummy to get the overtrick. What about finessing the ♣9 and running the ♦10 as well? Losing only 420 gave the Norwegians 85 MPs back, but Mariani/Buratti stayed right on track to their title.

Equity and Law 12C3

In yesterday's bulletin there was a report of Appeal Number Three in which the TD had given a weighted score based on the assumption that the defending side, being misinformed about a call from their opponents, could have made a better opening lead, being rightly informed. That better lead was not obvious even with the right information, but the chance of finding it certainly had been improved. The TD's decision was to calculate the score for the defenders based on half the time finding the right lead and half the time leading a wrong suit. For the offending side the score was based on their opponents leading the right suit all the time. This approach is in accordance with law 12C2, where the offenders get the most unfavourable result that was at all probable. For the non-offenders, 12C2 assigns the most favourable result that was likely without the irregularity. And 12C3 gives the possibility to vary the adjusted score in order to do equity. That is what the TD did when giving the weighted score to the non-offenders.

In an extra comment the Appeals Committee considers the possibility to give this weighted score to both sides and furthermore to assign a procedural penalty to the offenders resulting in the score as given by the TD. The committee had the feeling that both sides should be equally involved in the 12C3 striving-for-equity-procedure.

In my opinion the Laws do not suggest that approach. We use the word 'equity' in the Laws without giving a definition. But even giving adjusted scores following the description as given in 12C2, the aim of the TD should be to strive for equity, which is done by assigning independent scores for both sides. Why then should 12C3 prescribe, or suggest to prescribe, that both assigned scores need to be equal?

And isn't it strange to use 'equity' as the reason to assign the same score for the offenders after which that score is reduced by a procedural penalty? Which also has the big disadvantage that the same kind of infraction, often being a wrong explanation, is treated in very different ways. With varying penalties depending on the size of damage, going from zero to game- or even slam swings. I am not in favour of that kind of procedural penalties, they should be fixed as much as possible.

Equity is served by giving the non-offenders a fair, but not too high, score on a board when an infraction makes it necessary to adjust the score. That consideration is not valid for the offenders.

Since the possibility to use 12C3 is now also given to TDs, we need to agree on the application. May I propose to apply the approach as given in 12C2 when adjusting scores under 12C3, meaning that the scores for the two sides do not need to be balanced?

Mosca was right in using Stayman on this hand. There was the risk of ending up off-target but the reward could be high. Please note North's overcall: all those Ladies looked like having gone to his head! It did not hurt, because to put a contestant like Luciana Capodanno out of the bidding you would need a whole regiment of adventurous bidders: "If my partner uses Stayman and then

does not support hearts, guess which major suit he's got..."

On the lead of the ♥AK and a diamond switch, Luciana had little trouble in making 11 tricks for an excellent score in either event. Few players had taken the risk of using Stayman.

The previous board featured a fit problem. Below, we have a rebid problem.

The first point to note: when Luciana opens the bidding, she has her opening bid. This solid style has the effect of not launching the pair to intolerable heights.

What would you have rebid on Mosca's cards after partner's INT bid? Carlo opted for a waiting bid which left the way open for a possible retreat to spades. Fortunately, there was no such retreat as Luciana preferred to raise partner's second suit with her five-card support. In the massacre of spade partscores penalized by the bad trump split, a candle lit the lonely diamond partscore of our pair.

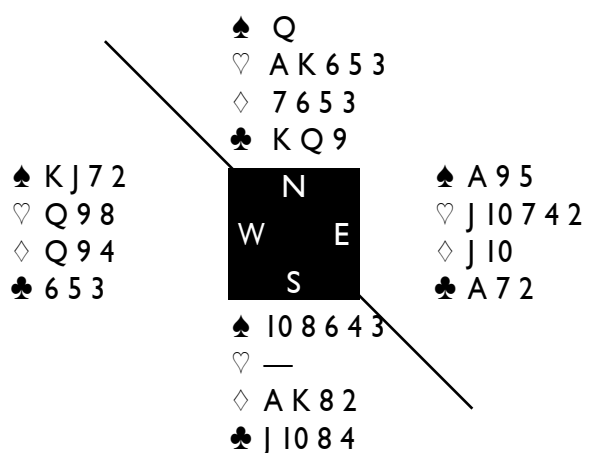

Contract:

Four Diamonds, played by North.

Result:

10 tricks, +130 to North/South.

The Facts:

West called the Director after the bid of Four Diamonds, to report a break in tempo in the return of the tray with Three No Trump.

The Director:

Considered that passing Three No Trump was a logical alternative.

Ruling:

Score adjusted to Three No Trump, making eight tricks; -50 to North/South.

North/South appealed.

The Players:

West stated that the tray had remained on the other side for two minutes. South said she had agreed, at the table, that there had been some delay, more than 15 seconds, but certainly not of two minutes. North agreed that he had taken some time in selecting his bid, but attributed the delay to East asking questions. East stated categorically that she had not asked any questions after 3NT, but only after 2♦.

South explained her bidding. 2♦ is non-forcing, showing five cards in hearts and at least four in diamonds (they play four-card majors). She had bid 3♦ on trumps rather than points. She could picture her partner with 1-5-4-3, since with 2-5-4-2 he would have bid 3♠, and she felt that 3NT would not make. Although she had noticed the delay, she felt it was not pronounced enough to compromise her in the bidding.

The Committee:

Had to find the answer to three questions:

- 1) Had there been Unauthorised Information?
While the Committee did not believe the delay had been two minutes, it did consider the delay to be in the order of 30 seconds. South had admitted to a delay, and North had admitted to thinking. It was felt that any delay should, in the eyes of South, be attributable to partner, and so Unauthorised Information was considered present.
- 2) Did the Unauthorised Information suggest bidding 4♦?
While bidding 4♦ did seem the correct action, any hesitation would make it appear more likely that it would also be the winning action. In that sense, certainly the hesitation did suggest bidding 4♦.
- 3) Is passing a logical alternative?
The Committee agreed that bidding Four Diamonds was a normal action on the hand. However, for it to be the winning action, one has to find two tricks more in diamonds than in No Trump. It was felt that, in Pairs, a substantial minority of players would in fact leave in the contract of Three No Trump and hope for the best. Indeed, give North the queen of diamonds, and have East leading clubs, and the contract is made.

Law 16 says that when in the possession of Unauthorised Information, and in the presence of a Logical Alternative, a player is not allowed to take the suggested action.

Therefore the Director was correct in adjusting the score.

The Committee's decision:

Director's decision upheld.

Relevant Laws:

Law 16A, Law 12C2.

Deposit:

Returned.

Committee's note:

Even if the responses to the three questions that need to be answered are individually marginal, the three pieces of doubt, taken together, do not make the action acceptable. Since the three responses were affirmative, the adjustment was appropriate.
