Probably the biggest upset of these two Round Robins was the elimination of the Monaco team even before the final round started. In Group A, GS Allegra from Turin, Italy, had been causing havoc all over group A, finishing with over 86 VP from a possible 100. The only team to keep up with the Italians' pace was the other qualifying team, Bulgaria's K1. Though they too, lost to Allegra, this happened at a time when both teams were already sure of making it to today's semis.

In group B, we had real drama in the end. The leaders before the final round, Reggio Emilia, had to play the Poles who were 1.9 VP behind them. The Russians, who were 0.24VP behind the Italians, had to play the Dutch who were 6,51 VP behind the Russians. So whoever would score a

comfortable enough win, would go through. As it happened, the Reggio Emilia v. Ruch Wrocław match ended in a tie so the Italians were certainly through. The Poles, whoever, had to wait for the result of the other match: a big win by either team in that match would see the winners through at the expense of the Poles. On the penultimate board of that match, the Dutch scored a big swing to lead by 13.20 to 6.80 VP which would not be enough to see either of them through, as the Russians were now 1.64 VP behind the Poles but still 0.11 VP ahead of the Dutch. When the last board proved a push, this also became the final outcome in group B. It thus would be Reggio v. Bulgaria K1 and GS Allegra v. Wrocław for the semifinals.



After the first day, the VP difference between the leaders and the last-placed team in Group A was 31 already. In Group B, this difference was only 10.5 as the Italians from Reggio Emilia were on just over 36 whereas the real Russians were on 16.6. The latter two teams were scheduled to meet in Round 3 on Friday morning, so we would get the opportunity to see if the Italians were to hold on to their lead or if the Russians would come back from behind to somewhere near a possible qualification spot.

On the first board, the Russians immediately showed their intentions:

By bidding one more, Gladysh did the right thing as $5\diamond$ is cold. Going on to $6\diamond$ thus only was a matter of changing +100 into -100, vital in pairs' events but usually not too costly in team matches.

Real Russia +400 here, so a gain to them of 7 IMPs had changed into a gain of 11 IMPs when E/W went on to six..




When the 2^{\heartsuit} overcall came back to him, Krasnosselski correctly judged he had a nice hand, so game was reached easily enough. As the combined N/S heart holding provided a double stopper, declarer could even afford to lose the club finesse and still come to nine tricks. Real Russia +430 when West was caught in a spade-diamond endplay when East returned a spade to dummy's king upon winning his PQ.

Cautious bidding by the Italians led to a non-vulnerable game being missed. Not overcalling proved quite useful to E/W this time. Reggio Emilia +150 but 7 more IMPs to Real Russia.

More IMPs to the Russians when their less cautious bidding talked the Italians out of a game:

When Basile correctly passed, the Russians had an easy road to 3NT once Gladysh could show a 15-17 NT in 4th position. Real Russia +400 as declarer had nine tricks by driving out the \clubsuit A after a diamond lead to the queen and ace.



When Lauria responded 1^{\heartsuit} to his partner's opening bid, everybody was impressed. They still were after his correction to $2\Diamond$ and rightly so, as this contract proved a make when the defence did not cash three rounds of trumps early on (would you have found this defence?). After ducking a club, Versace could dispose of a club loser on a top spade and ruff a club for his 8th trick. Real Russia another +90 and 10 more IMPs.

Two boards after this, the Reggio Emilians finally hit back severely. They produced mainly the same auction as their more famous counterparts but were more effective at the last hurdle.



Lauria, too, was taken by surprise but as the pair managed to stop in 5^{A} , not too much harm was done. They even gained 6 IMPs by going down only one, undoubled.

Once Gladysh could produce a competitive raise, Krasnosselski had no problem to raise to game and hope for the best. So it proved: Real Russia +650 on the lead of a top heart from East. When the \heartsuit A won the second round of hearts, the club loser later disappeared on a heart.

Against the weak NT, the penalty double got the Russians underway to a good partscore contract but it never occurred to them they had a game on in either clubs or NT. As it happened, South's redouble of 3° took away some room to manoeuvre so they eventually missed out on their best fit, ending up in not so good a partscore. Down four, Reggio Emilia +200.



When Lauria opened 1 which need not necessarily be natural, you would not necessarily need a diamond stopper to overcall INT. This overcall was duly found by Comella and it proved a success when it offered partner an easy raise. With the spade finesse working, the defence had no chance. Reggio Emilia +400and 12 IMPs back to them.



Once again, their strong INT in 4th position made it easy for the Russians to reach game. On a heart lead, declarer




won, led a spade to dummy's ten which held the trick and then continued a low club off dummy. East won the jack and returned a heart but was then squeezed on the run of the clubs. When he elected to blank his $\Diamond K$, declarer even made two overtricks when he led a diamond to his ace...Real Russia +660.

At the other table, Lauria's weak NT again did the trick as no penalty doubles were in use, apparently. On a low club lead, Lauria managed four tricks at a cost of 50 per undertrick. Reggio Emilia +150 but another 11 IMPs to Real Russia who thus won the match 63-40 or 15.11-4.89 VP.

The standings in Group B thus became very exciting with just two more matches to be played: the Poles were 8 VP ahead of a cluster of three teams with less than 0.7 VP between them: Reggio Emilia, Onstein and Real Russia. Even the 5th and 6th placed teams could theoretically make it into the semis at this point. It would be an interesting afternoon in this group, much more so than in the other group where the Bulgarians and the Allegra Italians both were more than a match ahead of the others.



Bulgaria has had a very good start of the round robin phase so far, but the real challenges were yet to come.

The first big test for them was Monaco, and the action started immediately on the first board.

The first board had a motto "what you bid is what you play". Doubled, of course.

As you can see, your chances of scoring a game are not lost immediately when the opponents overcall $3 \pm$ only. As soon as North produces a sound, you are there.'t Onstein +600.





On the actual layout, 3NT from North's hand can be beaten only with a queen of clubs lead. Overtaking the spade and playing the club would have set the contract but when Helness played a low spade it was quickly over. 10 IMPs to Bulgaria.


This is the type of N/S hands where you can easily go wrong. North's double in the second round shows some diamond strength but the number of hcp in the combined hands remains unclear. The spade fit, too, never came to light., even though N/S might even make game in that denomination. The final result of down two, +500 to the Poles, was the price the Dutch had to pay here...

Nanev was not comfortble with bidding his shorter and weaker suit after the information that spades are most likely breaking badly, so he simply bid diamonds twice.

In our other match, the problem of the vanishing spades also played its part. In the Open Room, however, it was in fact the problem itself that vanished rather than the spade suit, as N/S were playing Canapé.



After Helness opened East hand Bulgarians were in problems. Gunev passed the 2♥ opening bid and doubled Helgemo's 2♠ in the balacing position. That drove them to game but the notrump declarer was North, not South. Spade lead crushed through Q10 meant an easy one off and 13 IMPs to Monaco.

Few more IMPs exchanged hands until the end of the match so the end came with the result at 57-50 for Monaco or 11.83 - 8.17 VP.As a consequence, Monaco cold no longer qualify for the semis when it turned out that Allegra had scored a nother big win.

The 't Onstein-Ruch AZS match ended 52-45 or the same 11.83-8.17 VP to 't Onstein. On board 36, a Dutch declarer went down in a seemingly unbeatable 5 \clubsuit contract for 13 IMPs to the Poles and on the last board of the set, the Dutch reached 3NT with only one half of a heart stooper between them: \heartsuit Q10 opposite \heartsuit xx. Down two when the suit broke 6-3. Needless to say, 5 \diamondsuit was cold and duly bid by the Poles. Due to the BBO temporary breakdown we are a littleshort of info here...

With one round to play, the cluster of three teams had moved into places 1-3, with 't Onstein, 5-7VP behind them, being forced to beat Real Russia in their last match to keep alive their chances for a semifinal berth.
