

The second set started with some technical problems, so we missed some action and will try to bring you as much information as we can.

Board 18 was not actually played in the match. It was played in the Closed Room only, but there the Bulgarians managed to bring home an impossible notrump game after some defensive errors. The director decided to adjust the score of this board to 10 IMPs for Bulgaria. So the Bulgarians increased their lead after the second board of the second set, but after that the hell broke loose.

Board 22 brought us a suboptimal play by the Bulgarian East which was punished by the Bridge gods.

After the normal bidding, Stefanov got a trump lead and it seemed that he suffered a minor stroke when he took it in hand and played a major instead of taking it in dummy and playing a minor. The stroke was not fatal for the declarer, but it was fatal for the contract. After losing a heart and another trump back he took it in dummy and finessed clubs but now he was one entry short when king of clubs turned out to be fourth. Italy +100.



Fornaciari didn't have any minor health problems on this one and he brought it home after the diamond lead for +600 and +12 Italy.

Italy took another two-digit swing on board 27 when Nanev and Gunev bid an unmakeable slam on their mirror hands and Italians stopped in game. 6♠ down one, and 4♠ plus one meant +11 IMPs to Italy.

The Italians closed their IMP gaining streak on the penultimate board of the set. Do you trust that opponents can find their best fit? Stefanov didn't and it cost a bit.

Stefanov was obviously afraid that opponents are in the wrong contract so he didn't double 5♣ and collected +200 when it went two off. But he could only have saved few IMPs here since his teammates didn't find their best fit.

After a nebulous diamond opening in South, and an artificial 2♦ by North that I was not able to decypher until the closing of this article, NS finished in the inferior minor suit game. Gianardi decided Gunev had nowhere to run so she doubled for down three, +800 and +12 IMPs to Italy to set the score at 78-59 with one set to play.




G.S. ALLEGRA V RUCH WROCLAW



With 16 boards to play, GS Allegra, the defending champions, were looking at a 29-IMP lead, healthy enough but by no means big enough for them to sit back and relax, as the Poles proved right on the first board.

Bocchi showed a strong balanced type of hand by rebidding 2° and Madala showed his hearts with $3 \spadesuit$. Against a certain spade lead, Bocchi then preferred the Moysian fit to the more straightforward 3NT. Due to the duplication in the black suits, they would have to lose four tricks anyway, whereas there happened to be nine top tricks in 3NT. One down.+50 to the Poles.



The Polish Club made it easy to get to 3NT as North's INT rebid showed the 18-19 range. Just made and 10 IMPs back to the Poles.

On board 3, the Poles recouped six more IMPs when the Italians overbid to a hopeless game so the Italian lead had dropped to 17 when board 7 arrived, probably the decisive board of the set.

This is not such a good slam as it would have no play once the club finesse is wrong. Even if this finesse is working, there is still a lot of work to do as you have to get rid of a lot of hearts. You might ruff a few of them in dummy but this plan will fail if the defenders can play a second round of trumps in time. As a consequence, you will go down if the defence starts off by leading a trump — and that is exactly what Madala did. As soon as declarer gives up a heart, a second round of trumps leaves him with no chance whatsoever. Well done by Allegra for +100.


20 was an artificial game force.

When South led a heart, the second best lead, Sementa had no trouble in ruffing two hearts and taking a success-

ful club finesse to land his contract. Allegra +1370 and 16 IMPs to lead by 33.

It looked all over but then came the next board...



In the Open Room, the Poles did well to take the save as 5% looks cold as the cards lay, whereas 6% would be easily defeated on a diamond lead. Allegra +100.


We will never know if the state of the match had anything to do with North's decision to bid one more but it turned out to be the winning move when West led a spade rather



than a diamond. Declarer ruffed, conceded to the $\heartsuit A$ and took the winning club finesse. When the suit broke, he could dispose of all his diamond losers and chalk up a tremendous +1210 to get 15 IMPs back. The deficit was down to 18 again.

After this, we saw a long series of partscore hands, right through till the end of the match. Here are the first two of them, just to illustrate the difference in approach by both teams.

 $2 \ensuremath{\heartsuit}$ showed a weak hand with both majors, unspecified suit length.

Bocchi led a trump to the queen and king, which seems to give up the defensive trump trick. This was not quite true, as we shall see. Declarer played a spade to the ten and king and won the diamond return with dummy's ace. He then cashed the $\triangle A$ and the $\lozenge K$ and ruffed a diamond in hand. A spade was ruffed in dummy and another diamond ruffed in hand. When North overruffed with the jack and returned a trump, the defence had the rest of the tricks. One down, Allegra +100.



At the other table, Duboin would have nothing of it. He stuck to the old adage that a 5-2 fit should be preferred over a 4-3 fit and he proved right once again. He finished up with an overtrick when all suits behaved pretty well. So another +140 to Allegra, 6 IMPs to them almost out of nothing.

On the next board, it was again a matter of bidding carefully.

 $I \diamondsuit$ showed hearts. This modest contract just came home for +80 to Allegra.

As South could not rebid INT in Polish Club, he had to introduce a possible three-card major. The raise was automatic but the safety level thus had been passed automatically as well as there are at least six losers glaring into declarer's face. Down two, another +200 to Allegra who thus added another 7 IMPs from nowhere to their tally to lead by 31 now.

A few more hands of this type saw the Italians' lead go up a bit more as the match progressed. The final score became 106-67 to GS Allegra.






The Bulgarians entered the last set trailing by 19 IMPs and were very eager to find some IMPs that would change the momentum of the match.

And, suddenly, nothing happened. The first ten boards saw 7 IMPs exchange hands, Bulgaria leading 6-1 and thus reducing the gap to 14 IMPs. But they were in a desperate need for some huge gain.

And then came the board II with the motto "lead the unbid minor".

After Stefanov bid clubs, Sabbatini was aware of the board motto and settled for a game in spades. A diamond lead meant a quick 11 tricks for NS and +450 ltaly.



Gunev was also aware of the board motto so he knew he would get a club lead and thus he confidently bid a slam in spades which was, of course, cold after the king of clubs

lead. Bulgaria +980 and +11 desperately needed IMPs for them.

Five boards to go, Italy was up 5 IMPs. Board 12 was a push and board 13 saw the Italian lead melt away.

After Comella bid 2♣ the Italians were overboard. The good defence should set even INT but that is a challenge. 2NT was no challenge for the defence and when Comella chose to play on diamonds rather than clubs it looked like it would finish two off. In the end the defence allowed him to score his 7th trick making it one off and +100 for Bulgaria.



Since Gunev decided to stay low Bulgaria got a chance to level the match score. It is not easy to make the proper timing in the defence and take 7 tricks before the declarer does. The race in the Closed Room finished with Gunev arriving first at the 7 tricks finish line, scoring +90 and +5 IMPs for Bulgaria with 3 boards to go.

And then:

When Stefanov decided to open his balanced II count cabbage, Aronov could easily compete over 2♠ landing in 3♠ that easily made with an overtrick. Bulgaria +130.

With Mina silent in East it was very difficult for Basile to enter the auction so the Italians sold out to 2♠ that easily made. +110 and +6 IMPs Bulgaria to take the lead in the match with two boards to go.

On the last two boards, we saw just two IMPs being scored, one for each team, although the last board had a swing potential when a 21 count no special feature game was available for North-South. But this game was practically impossible to bid, only 2 pairs in the whole field found it (Russia and Sweden).

The final score was 88-82 for Bulgaria meaning that the "other minor lead" slam pushed them to finals and the possibility for a vendetta against the other Italian team that beat them in the group phase.




Right on the first board of the final, the holders took the lead when Aronov, having to find out which defender might hold a doubleton spade honour, misguessed the situation in 5% for one down. Ferraro guessed right in the same contract.. That was 11 IMPs to Allegra.

Two boards later, 7 IMPs went back to K I when Ferraro passed partner's INT holding a weak 5-2-4-2 opening hand. The $2 \diamondsuit$ rebid, duly found in the other room, would have hit the jackpot.

On board 5, we saw two spectacular auctions leading to the same contract..

Over partner's invitational 24, Stefanov had to accept the consequences of his frivolous overcall. Not so frivolous after all, as he easily made nine tricks when South led a club. Even a trump lead would not defeat this contract. KI a nice +140.



In the other room, Nanev's INT duly stopped Sementa from frivolously entering the auction but this time, his partner had the last word. Sementa happily passed Ferraro's

double and the defenders quickly set the contract three tricks when Sementa led his singleton diamond by means of five top tricks and three ruffs, basically the same tricks as declarer made in the other room...Allegra+800 and 12 IMPs to them.

Two boards later, KI reached a relatively thin vulnerable game:

 $3\Diamond$ showed a mixed raise but partner's $3\Diamond$ enquiry did not make Bocchi happy. Ten tricks when the $\bigstar K$ behaved well. Allegra +170.



 2° was either any splinter or a mixed raise. When 3^{\bullet} denied the splinter, Gunev just bid one more for the road, not wanting to miss a vulnerable game with his nice 5-4-3-1 distribution. Right he was, +620 to the Bulgarians and 10 IMPs to them to trail by 6.

Two boards later, we saw another possible slam coming up.

Once the Bulgarians decided to have a go at six, quite reasonably so once East bid 5NT "pick a slam," Bocchi had no option but to save at the 7-level. Down three, K I +500.



When Sementa contented himself with 5% only over partner's double, he showed that he probably was not thinking about a slam at all. The Italians thus sold out at $6\clubsuit$ for down two and a 5-IMP loss.

On the next board, it was slam time again, the slam for E/W being cold this time. As so often, the Italians had little trouble in getting there:


Four Diamonds was barrage. 4NT in the Italian style is not Blackwood but just a general further enquiry. When Ferraro showed a good hand for his bidding with values in clubs, Sementa sensed that a slam might be in the air, so he bid it. Allegra + 1370.

Strong Club and 24 showing diamonds. Over North's 34, there was no room left for E/W to show the spade void at a safe level and thus the slam was missed. K1 +620 but 13 IMPs to Allegra to lead by 14. With the help of two more partscore swings the Italian lead had gone up to 25 when the last board of the segment came up.

INT was 9-12 and 30 was general GF. Five Spades asked about trump quality. When Bocchi suggested another trump suit, Madala was happy to accept. Allegra +940 when the black suits both behaved.

With no mini-NT available, the Bulgarians in the closed room came nowhere near bidding a slam despite a strong I♣ opening by South.After the diamond intervention, clubs were never mentioned as a suit so any chance of getting to a slam was gone. KI scored +480 but lost I0 more IMPs to trail 22-57 after the first segment.
