Situation in Denmark

School bridge initiative started in 2012

New school reform starting 2014

More time for new subjects like bridge

Danish School Bridge Association established 2015

Local representatives in all parts of the country

Schools are open and interested, and LIKE bridge

Now playing bridge in 130+ schools

Based on cooperation with local bridge clubs

Working to move bridge from school to spare time activity



Why teach young people to play bridge

Bridge is the most challenging MINDSPORT. Playing bridge develops and improves

Concentration ability – improves learning in all subjects
Cooperation – bridge is a partnership game
Communication – important game information between partners
Problem solving – instant analyzing and deduction
Social – Improves social habits and abilities
Networking – Friendships and business contacts
Fun – while getting smarter, why not



Teaching programmes

Intro days (3-4 hours)
Short teaching programmes – 5 x 2 hours
Longer teaching programmes – 10-15 weeks
Bridge as part of curriculum

What do you need

Connections and agreements with schools, do it yourself
Teaching material for kids
Results from the beginning – it is a competition
Duplicated boards
One helper per table the first 2 or 3 times
Very little talk – learning by doing



Benefits for Schools, Parents and Kids

Schools:

- + Concentration, + Cooperation, Communication Kids:
- + FUN, + Socializing with friends, + Competitive Parents:

Family bonding – across 3 generations



Challenges

Kids do not play cards

Bidding is tough – may take away the fun

Get them to keep playing with other kids

Getting parents interested
