ENTC Madeira 2021 Update

The EBL is disappointed to announce that, due to the ongoing uncertainty surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic and the situation disimproving in so many countries, the National Team Championships planned for June 2021 in Madeira have been cancelled.

With the co-operation of our very flexible and accommodating hosts, the Portuguese Bridge Federation, we hope to finally go to Madeira in June 2022, for the twice postponed National Team Championships.

In the meantime, should the WBF decide to go ahead with the World Teams Championships later this year, the EBL will organise an alternative method to determine the Zone 1 qualifiers. If such qualification will be held online, it is likely to be within the original Championship time period - 12 – 22 June.

The WBF has not yet made its final decision and may not do so before sometime in May.

In preparation, the EBL is finalising a detailed protocol for an online event which would include, amongst many other security features, players playing in a designated domestic location, set up according to very specific criteria, supervised by independent international observers.

Some number of clubs came together to run paid tournaments too. This helps the relatively smaller clubs with their routine costs. All clubs face the risk of closing down for good if the covid19 threat goes on for another year.

NOW - April 2021

Scottish Bridge Clubs cannot re-open for the foreseeable future: laws currently forbid more than 6 adults from no more than 2 households getting together indoors.

About half our members have registered for online tournaments; some others are managing the occasional rubber game in each other's homes.

We are concerned that some of the smaller clubs will never recover. The larger ones keep going with online tournaments on BBO.

NOW - April 2021

Scotland has had no face-to-face bridge since mid-March 2020. But the Scottish Bridge Union has made great efforts to encourage online bridge and found a number of keen volunteers to act as Tournament Directors. Many of our members have really taken to online - on the whole we get better turnouts for club district and national tournaments than we did when people had to travel. Bridge has been a godsend to players with no other form of social communication.

Lots of people are running online lessons, so we attract new members that way.

It seems likely that if / when things return to 'normal' we shall have to continue to run online events for the benefit of those who cannot for some reason attend their local clubs - some may prefer online to venturing out on a cold winter's evening.

We have an Online League of 8 Divisions - 84 teams in all. The Camrose series (between England, Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales) has been played on RealBridge, with video communication which makes it more sociable.

We have also formed a link with South Africa, and run regular matches against their teams.

Our Women very much enjoy the EBL matches, thanks to the organisers.

Denmark Sept 2020



Denmark was among the first countries in Europe to enforce a complete lock-down on its population from

the beginning of March to June, forcing us all to stop playing live-bridge and join the virtual tables on BBO. After having swallowed the pain and sorrow of the cancellation of all international live bridge championships in 2020, actually, I came to play more during the three months of lock down than I ever did before.

Today, the Danish bridge clubs are open again and most members have returned to their beloved hobby and sport, which is only truly authentic with cards in the hands and with real people at the table. Although new restrictions are introduced almost every day due to increasing infection rates, all sit-down activity is still allowed in Denmark. Of course, life is not exactly the same as before at the table. Now, we play with our own bidding box, have our own deck of cards at the table, only one player can touch the Bridge-mate, and we use an awful amount of hand sanitizer. Further to this, in my club, there is thermometer at the door entry, and we play behind plexi-glass screens. The latter can be an advantage though, as it is difficult to hear your partner's post hoc analysis of the board you just played.

Denmark April 2021

NOW - April 2021

The corona-virus has not had the same impact on morbidity and mortality in Denmark as in other European countries. The "hammer" with complete lock-down and severe restrictions has been used extensively by our Government. However, the apathy among Danes from this strategy is clear to see, and as more people get vaccinated, it is time to impose "the dance" with Covid now and open the society again. The other day, I was walking in sunny Copenhagen and saw the squares bursting with people who were outside to celebrate the coming of spring like cows on new grass. And that gave me a hope - as green as Madeira.

For bridge players, the move from live to online bridge has benefits in terms of relative ease of play at any time without the need for transportation, but also severe costs in terms of lack of true social interaction and the constant fear and suspicion of cheating. Therefore, for the sake of bridge as a sport, we really need to get back to the green table.

Our 2020 women team was reselected for the European Championship in 2021, so the team is the same, but the waiting time between tournaments has indeed been different. Our team has practiced much more as a team than any other national team I played with. I am sure part of the reason for this is Covid and the home-bound situation, it has put us in. I counted more than 60 practice matches by team Denmark on BBO since the beginning of 2020. To this comes individual bidding practice and loads of boards with other partners. Our team also played three international online women tournaments, two of which were organized by the EBL and we did well in all three. Of course, yet another cancellation of Madeira was tough to swallow. I sincerely hope that we can keep up our team spirit while waiting for a live bridge event where we can try it out.

Lone wrote when hopeful of the Championships taking place in Madeira this June '...So, the hypothesis is easy to make that the covid crisis is the burning platform that will make a great team spirit. However, we hope that we will be able to test this hypothesis at the live-EC in Madeira in June. While we wait for the decision from EBL, we must visualize the fresh smell of the blue Atlantic Sea, the dark lava, the sun, the green hills, the "levadas", the fruits, the flowers, the seafood, the Portuguese language and most importantly, playing live bridge at the European Championship.'

Estonia sept 2020



Maarja is Coordinator and Player for EBL Women's Practice matches Estonia

September 2020: As to live bridge, in Estonia we've started getting back to more or less normal: both clubs and bigger tournaments are happening, with only the 50% requirement for rooms and of course disinfectants available to the players. (There is no mask requirement, as our Health Board doesn't strongly recommend wearing masks.) The first live tournament in the summer even had more participants than usual, probably because people had missed live bridge so much. Right now, we're preparing for the Estonian Teams' Championship which was cancelled in the spring and will hopefully happen in two weeks. I'm saying 'hopefully', because right now, COVID numbers have started rising again in Estonia, so it can't be excluded that the tournament will have to be cancelled. I'll let you know if that happens, so that the newsletter article will be up to date. It will be interesting to see how different countries have coped with bridge in these conditions!

Estonia sept 2020 - April 2021

September 2020 con'd

Since I promised you an update, I wanted to let you know that our national championship is still taking place this weekend. There has now been a decision on some additional rules: use of a thermometer, hand disinfectants available in each section, tables are spaced as wide apart as possible, bids must be explained in writing only (i.e. no whispering close to the opp's face), each player gets an individual bidding box for the whole tournament, and there is the possibility of an additional replacement player in the team. Use of masks is still voluntary, but masks are provided by the organiser for those who need them. Sadly, my own team has some additional complications, since one of our 3 pairs is Latvian, and Latvia has a 14-day-quarantine rule for countries with the infection rate over 16 (which includes Estonia). So unfortunately, it is likely that we will have to play with 2 pairs (our Latvian friends unfortunately cannot afford the quarantine, work-wise), unless a different decision is made by the Latvian government by Friday.

In the end my Latvian friends played and helped us win the silver medal.

NOW - April 2021

Since the time of the last newsletter, unfortunately the COVID-19 situation in Estonia has worsened considerably – we are now among the countries with highest infection rates in Europe.

This has resulted in tightening restrictions, which among other activities have made bridge impossible both on national and local club level.

There have been no live tournaments since November, and first ones (national team championships) are planned (optimistically) in May.

The women's practice matches, as well as weekend tournaments on BBO and Real Bridge, have for this reason been a welcome chance to play – especially Real Bridge, which offered an experience somewhat comparable to actually sitting at a table, being able to see and chat to our opponents (albeit having to 'invite' all the opponents to our homes).

On the national level, we have short (6x3 boards) tournaments twice per week as well, but the number of participants is not high (usually ~20 pairs, which is fewer than in bigger local clubs). I really hope to be able to play some actual, face-to-face bridge in the summer at least!

Israel 2021

How is Bridge coming back in a vaccinated country?

On February 2020 Covid-19 arrived to Israel. Almost immediately, all bridge activities stopped. No more clubs, no more frontal competitions...

But soon all bridge activities moved to BBO. National competitions, as well as regular club activities, started to take place in the BBO. Of course, this has caused various well known problems (like cheating, use of robots, and the hardest maybe is the financial situation of the bridge clubs). But this is what we had, and with that we won!

In December 2020 the vaccination process began in Israel. Each individual has got two phase vaccine 3 weeks apart. A week after the second vaccination one is considered vaccinated. Today about 50% percent of the Israeli population is vaccinated, when about 80% of the population with age above 29 is vaccinated! So, now frontal bridge is returning. Many bridge clubs are opened. Allowed to play:

- 1) Only IBF (Israeli Bridge Federation) members
- 2) Either vaccinated or recovered players

Masks are required during all staying in the club, except where screens are used. Various clubs acquired transparent screens in order to prevent the need for masks. Also, the space between tables is 2 meters.

Beside regular club activities, national events are in the process of returning to normal Zoom less events. The next simultaneous competition will be partially frontal and partially online. After Pesach, activities that almost completely stopped will return, including women and youngsters' bridge.

So – vaccination is indeed allowing us to maintain our routine life. I just want to add that not everyone in Israel is happy with vaccinations, there are many people that oppose them for various reasons. These people are having a hard life, as various places and activities require vaccination (or recovery): Work places, sport centers, culture events like theaters, etc.

In any case, we do hope that the world will return to normal life, including the bridge world. And we hope we soon meet in Madeira for the European Championship 😊😊

Marie Montuir's Project

That's Entertainment!

The French based company Entertainment 52 is a significant figure in the world of bridge. It owns the two biggest online platforms in the world, Funbridge and BBO and also publishes, under the mantle of Le Bridgeur, *Be BRIDGE*, a glossy bi-monthly life-style magazine that combines traditional articles about the game with biographies, cultural and travel information and an array of features for everyone, even those with only a passing interest in bridge.

The team behind BeBRIDGE is headed by CEO Karine Meyer-Naudan, the daughter of Jean- Paul Meyer and she has assembled a formidable team to bring about what she describes as a '*real revolution in the world of bridge*'.

Muriel Clement, Isabelle Fontaine & Sonia Valoura have recently been joined by leading journalists Florine Constant and Marie Montuir. Florine is busy preparing an article featuring bridge teachers while Marie is currently working on a major story about the way in which the world's bridge federations have risen to the numerous challenges imposed by the pandemic. Both are set to appear in the May issue.

BeBRIDGE is a bimonthly 96-page online magazine available by subscription. It aims to reach and grow the current readership of over 50,000 per issue to encompass the 400,000 users of the companies in the 52 Entertainment Group – who between them play some **four million deals every day!**

Making It Real



Co-founder Shireen Mohandes tells us how RealBridge went from lockdown project to platform used all around the world by national event organisers, clubs, and teachers.

Lockdown project

Almost a year ago today, Graham Hazel, an English bridge-player and I.T. professional, found himself, like most of us, at home with some time on his hands. Also, like others, he was playing more online bridge, and finding that it was OK, but not quite like the real thing. What do you do when the software doesn't do what you want? If you're Graham, you write your own.

Two months later, he had the core of what you see at the table today – an interface for playing bridge, with built-in audio and video. He showed it to me, and I went “Wow!”



RealBridge

A long hot summer

There was still a huge amount to do. We spent the summer designing and building the rest of the system, testing exhaustively on different types of hardware, and spreading the word about the new platform.

We wanted a platform that was good for everybody, so we consulted everybody: players, tournament directors, teachers, club owners, and major-event organisers. Everybody had ideas: mostly good; some quite challenging; some rather impractical.

Many hands make light work, especially when you're testing a multi-person game. A group of about 30 people from around the world rallied round and joined in the testing sessions. We are eternally grateful to them for all their help.

Clubs in England, Norway, Germany, Australia and India started running their games on the beta version. National bridge organisations got interested, starting with the English Bridge Union and the USBF. Both of these organisations were very supportive, and started running events on RealBridge in the early autumn.

Launch

In November 2020 we launched the platform commercially. By now we had a solid core of clubs and teachers using the platform. It had already been used successfully for two national events and one international one (that was a nervous moment!).

A few months on, and RealBridge has been adopted by more than 1000 clubs and teachers, and nearly 20 NBOs. We have a growing team of staff – currently four of us, with more joining soon.

What's next?

Online bridge will never replace face-to-face bridge, but it doesn't have to be a poor relation. We're determined that RealBridge will be a big part of the future of bridge.

We are continuously working on new features. This week's release added broadcast video features for directors and teachers. In the next few weeks, we expect to provide significant improvements to the vugraph experience. We have more things planned for later in the year.

Who has helped to shape RealBridge?

We have had huge amounts of advice and support from players, directors and organisers at every level.

Amongst NBOs and major event-organisers, our greatest helpers have been Jan Martel at the USBF, the EBU led by Gordon Rainsford, Marianne Harding from Norway, Pierre Schmidt from France, Sukrit Vijayakar's Bridge from Home team in India, Antonio Riccardi from Italy, Sus Vang and Jan Nielsen from Denmark, Linnea Edlund from Sweden, and many others.

It's never too late - Finally, a story from the TV news in the UK: Bessie Hyder, from the North of England, had her 106th birthday recently. She celebrated by eating some cake, then joining a game on RealBridge.
